### **Mary Faith Marshall, Ph.D.**

Mary Faith Marshall, Ph.D., is Professor of Medicine and Bioethics, School of Medicine at Kansas University Medical Center where she also holds joint appointments in the Schools of Nursing and Allied Health and the Department of History and Philosophy of Medicine. She is adjunct Professor of Medicine at the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Medicine. She is a Program Associate of the Midwest Bioethics Center where she is the principal investigator of the Kansas City Initiative to Promote Integrity in Biomedical Research.

At the Department of Health and Human Services, Dr. Marshall chairs the National Human Research Protections Advisory Committee and serves as a special expert consultant to the Office for Human Research Protections on research involving children and prisoners. At the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies she serves as an expert advisor to the committee, "Assessing the System for the Protection of Human Subjects of Research" and helped create its first report "Preserving the Public Trust: Accreditation and Human Research Participant Programs." Dr. Marshall serves on the Council of Academic Societies of the American Association of Medical Colleges and on the AAMC/CAS Task Force on Professional Mentoring. She has testified before congress and in U.S. District Court on the subject of perinatal substance abuse.

Dr. Marshall is an elected fellow in the American College of Critical Care Medicine and is a Fellow of the Kennedy Institute of Ethics at Georgetown University. She is past-president of the American Society for Bioethics and Humanities and past president of the American Association for Bioethics. At the National Institutes of Health, Dr. Marshall serves on both the cardiovascular and hematology data safety monitoring committees of the Heart Lung and Blood Institute. She served on the first special research ethics review panel advisory to the NIH Director, has been an on-site reviewer for the Office of Human Research Protections and the former Office for Protection from Research Risks, and has served on several special emphasis panels regarding clinical trials and research ethics.

Dr. Marshall received her undergraduate education and a Ph.D. in Religious Studies (concentration in Applied Ethics) at the University of Virginia where she was the Paddock Graduate Fellow in Biomedical Ethics. Dr. Marshall served on the

faculty of the Center for Biomedical Ethics at the University of Virginia Health Sciences Center from 1990-1993 where she was Director of Advanced Studies in Clinical Ethics and Director of the Health Sciences Center's Ethics Consultation Service. At the Medical University of South Carolina, she was Director of the Program in Bioethics and Associate Professor of Medicine.

Dr. Marshall is the author of numerous articles and book chapters She is a coauthor of the text, "Introduction to Clinical Ethics." She has been an awardee of the Substance Abuse Policy Research Program of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJ) and of the RWJ program Promoting Excellence in End-of-Life Care. She is co-author of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation report *Ethical and Legal Analyses of Coercive Policies Aimed at Substance Abuse by Pregnant Women*, and co-editor of the textbook, *Introduction to Clinical Ethics*. Her current research interests include ethical issues in human subjects research, ethical issues associated with cybernetics and artificial intelligence, and perinatal substance abuse.
