



■ New Hampshire adolescent reproductive health facts

New Hampshire was ranked 51 out of 51 (50 states + the District of Columbia) on 2011 final teen birth rates among females aged 15-19 (with 1 representing the highest rate and 51 representing the lowest rate).^{RH1} On a similar scale – where 1 is the highest teen *pregnancy* rate and 51 is the lowest – New Hampshire was ranked 50 out of 51 (50 states + the District of Columbia) in pregnancies to females aged 15- 19 in 2008.^{RH2}
