Purpose of PREP-PM

PREP performance measures will address three key issues:


- *Accountability.* The performance measures will serve as a vital tool to document that grantees are delivering the set of services they agreed to deliver and to track and report grantee progress to Congress.
- *Program implementation.* Systematic tracking of program performance and thoughtful analysis of these data can aid in learning about program implementation and identifying factors associated with greater implementation success and implementation challenges.
- *Program improvement.* The performance measures will serve as an important means to improve service delivery.

PREP-PM data originate from multiple levels



Three Categories of Performance Measures

- **Structure, cost, and support for program implementation**
- **Participant characteristics, perceptions of program experiences, perceptions of program effects**
- **Attendance, reach, and dosage**






State PREP – Support for program implementation increased in all 3 areas (2012-2013)




State PREP – More grant funds went towards program provision between reporting periods




State PREP- The number of PREP program facilitators nearly doubled between reporting periods




State PREP – The number of program providers that trained 100% of facilitators increased between reporting periods




State PREP – However, the overall percentage of program facilitators trained decreased in 2012-2013




State PREP –Facilitator observations increased at both the provider and facilitator levels




State PREP – Most frequently implemented PREP programs (2012-2013)




State PREP – Adult preparation topics addressed by programs (2012-2013)




State PREP – High-risk youth populations targeted by programs (2012-2013)




State PREP – Most implementation challenges reported by program providers were only ‘somewhat a problem’ (2012-2013)




State PREP – Almost all challenges reported by program providers decreased between reporting periods



State PREP – Technical assistance topics identified by program providers (2012-2013)




State PREP – Interest in technical assistance topics decreased between reporting periods






Tribal PREP – Nearly all grantees provided support for program implementation (2012-2013)




Tribal PREP – All program providers trained facilitators (2012-2013)




Tribal PREP – A majority of program facilitators were observed at least once (2012-2013)




Tribal PREP – Most frequently implemented PREP programs (2012-2013)




Tribal PREP – Adult preparation topics addressed by programs (2012-2013)




Tribal PREP – High-risk youth populations targeted by programs (2012-2013)
