

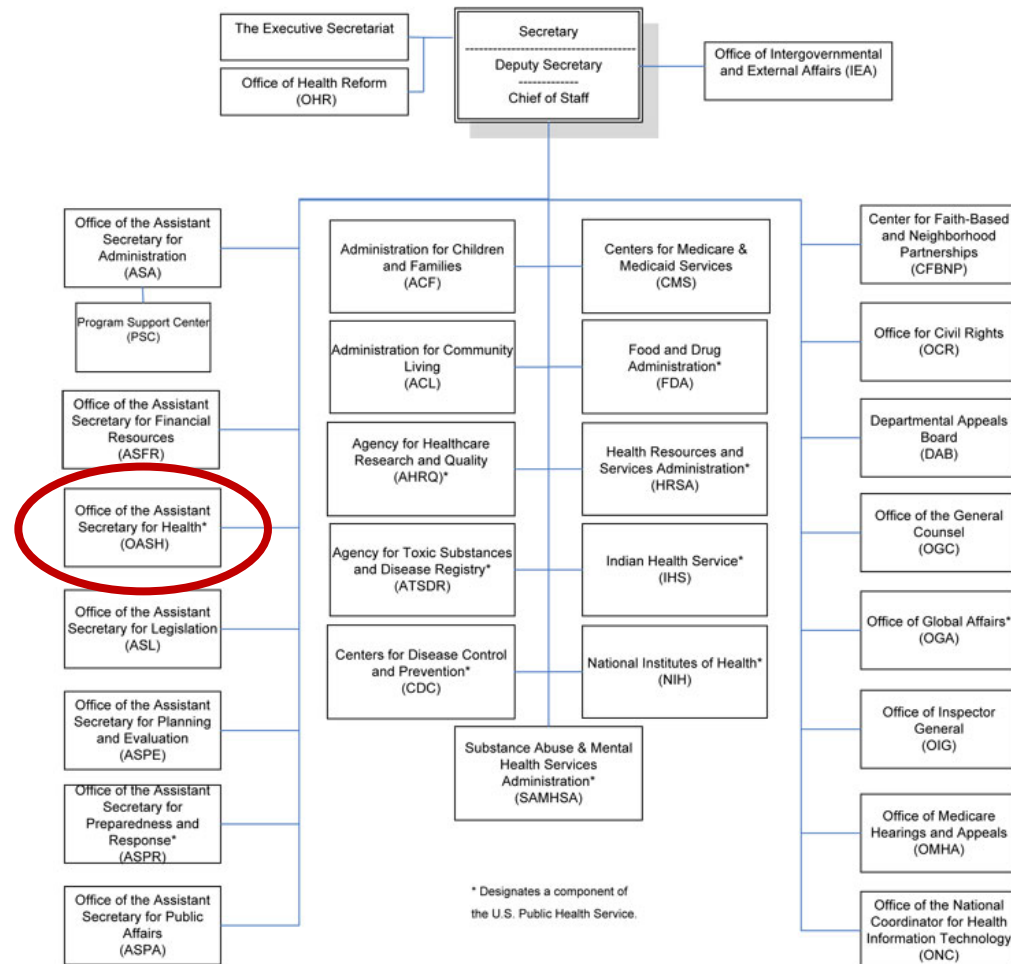

ODPHP Authorizing Legislation

■ Title XVII – Public Health Act

- A. *Formulate national goals, and a strategy to achieve such goals, with respect to health information and health promotion, preventive health services, and education in the appropriate use of health care*
- B. Coordinate disease prevention and health promotion activities, preventive health services, and health information and education within HHS
- C. Coordinate such activities in the private sector
- D. Establish a national health information clearinghouse
- E. Support projects, conduct research and disseminate information







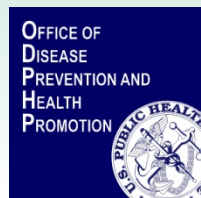


Healthy People: Framework for Improving Nation's Health

- A ***national agenda*** that communicates a vision for improving health and achieving health equity
- Creates a comprehensive ***strategic framework*** uniting health promotion and disease prevention issues under a single umbrella
- A set of science-based, ***measurable objectives with targets*** to be achieved by the year 2020
- Requires tracking of ***data-driven outcomes*** to monitor progress and to motivate, guide, and focus action

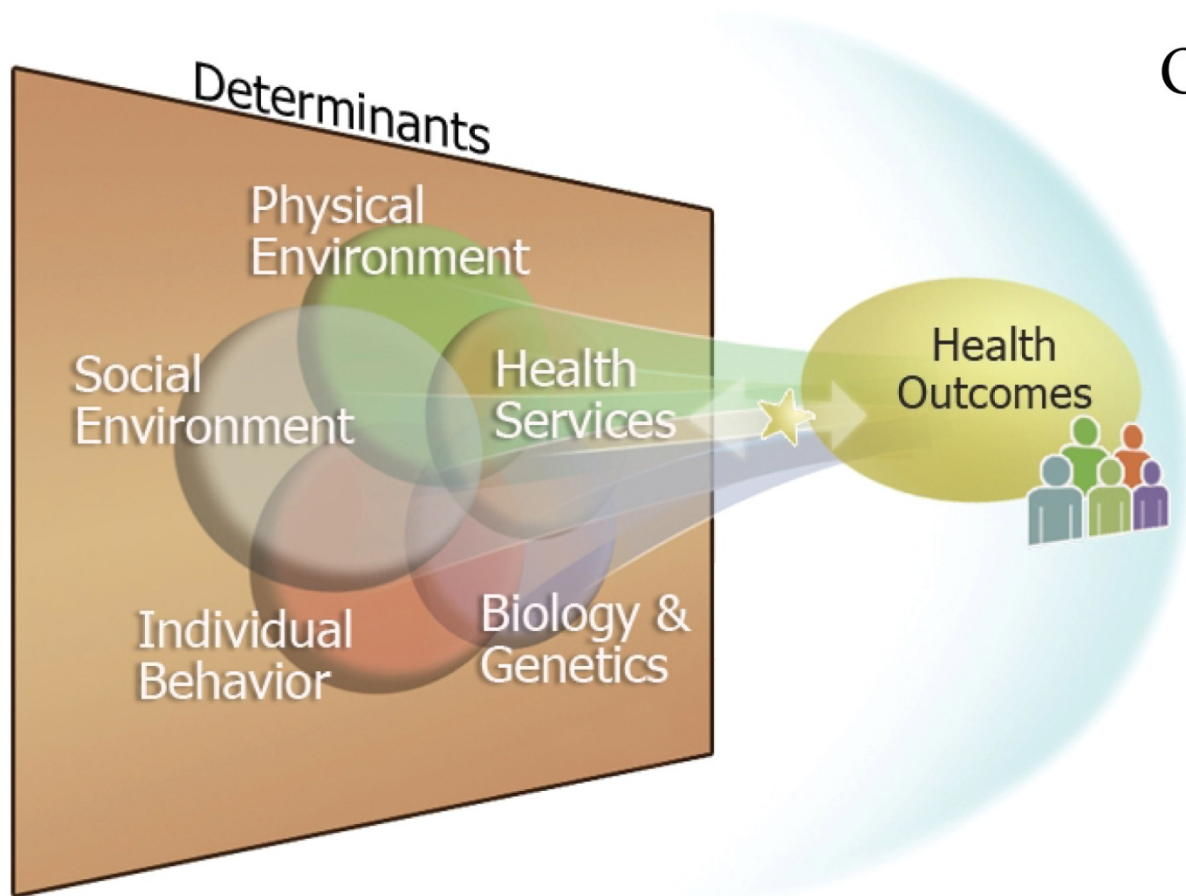

A society in which all people live long, healthy lives

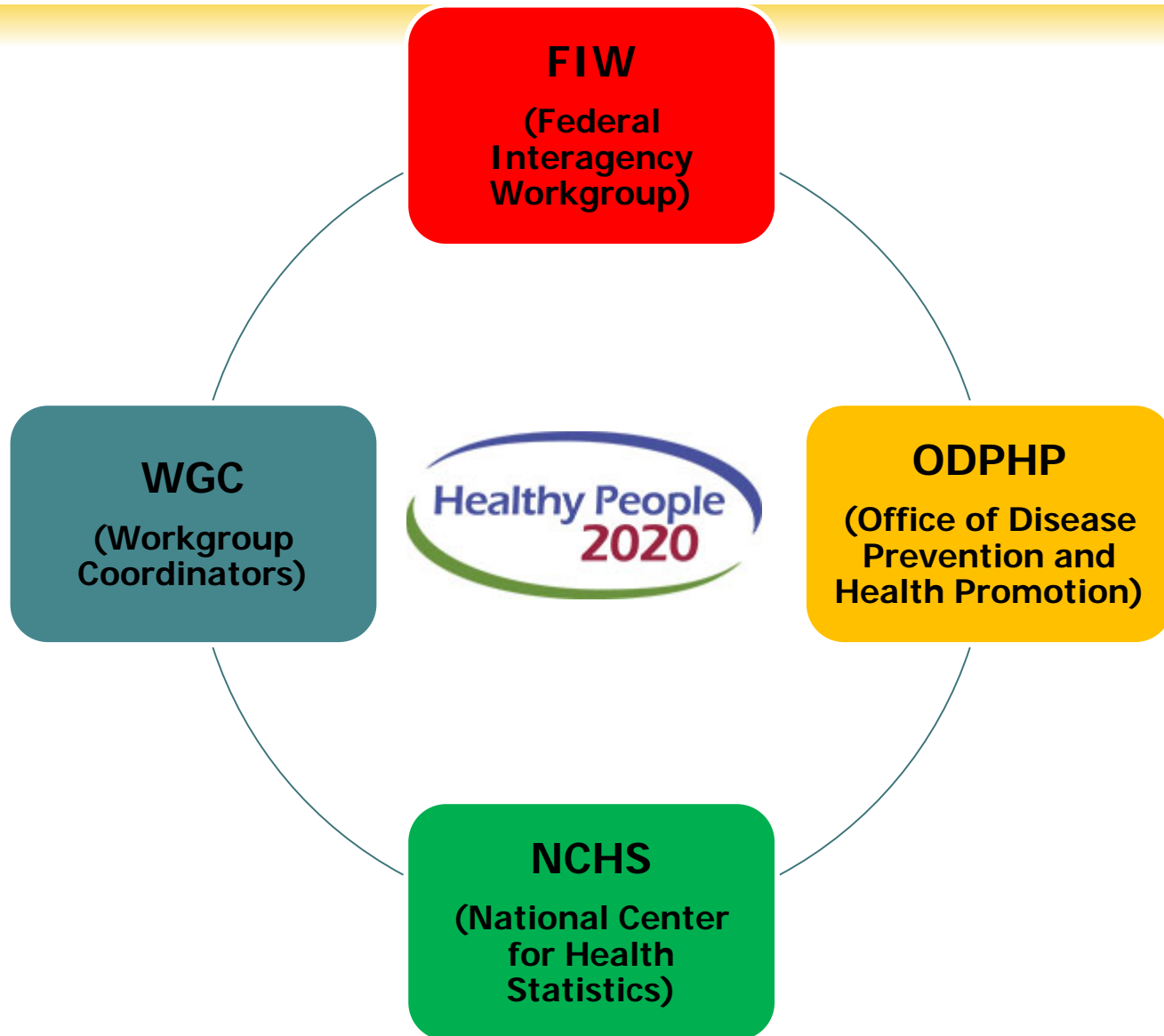


Overarching Goals:

- Promote quality of life, healthy development and healthy behaviors across all life stages.



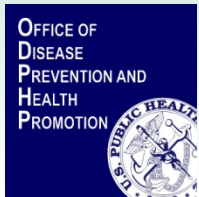

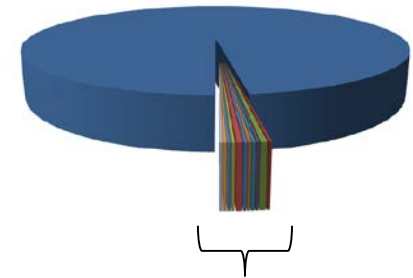




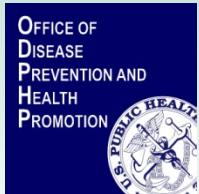

Overview

The increase in life expectancy during the 20th century is largely due to improvements in child survival; this increase is associated with reductions in infectious disease mortality, due largely to immunization.¹ However, infectious diseases remain a major cause of illness, disability, and death. Immunization recommendations in the United States currently target 17 vaccine-preventable diseases across the lifespan.

Healthy People 2020 goals for immunization and infectious diseases are rooted in evidence-based clinical and community activities and services for the prevention and treatment of infectious diseases. Objectives new to Healthy People 2020 focus on technological advancements and ensuring that States, local public health departments, and nongovernmental organizations are strong partners in the Nation's attempt to control the spread of infectious diseases. Objectives for 2020 reflect a more mobile society and the fact that diseases do not stop at geopolitical borders. Awareness of disease and completing prevention and treatment courses remain essential components for reducing infectious disease transmission.

Why Are Immunization and Infectious Diseases Important?

People in the United States continue to get diseases that are vaccine preventable. Viral hepatitis, influenza, and tuberculosis (TB) remain among the leading causes of illness and death in the United States and account for substantial spending on the related consequences of

IID-8 Increase the percentage of children aged 19 to 35 months who receive the recommended doses of DTaP, polio, MMR, Hib, hepatitis B, varicella and pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV)

LHI Revised

Baseline: 44.3 percent of children aged 19 to 35 months in 2009 received the recommended doses of DTaP, polio, MMR, Hib, hepatitis B, varicella, and PCV

Target: 80.0 percent

Target-Setting Method: Maintain consistency with national programs, regulations, policies, and laws.

Data Sources: National Immunization Survey (NIS), CDC/NCIRD and CDC/NCHS

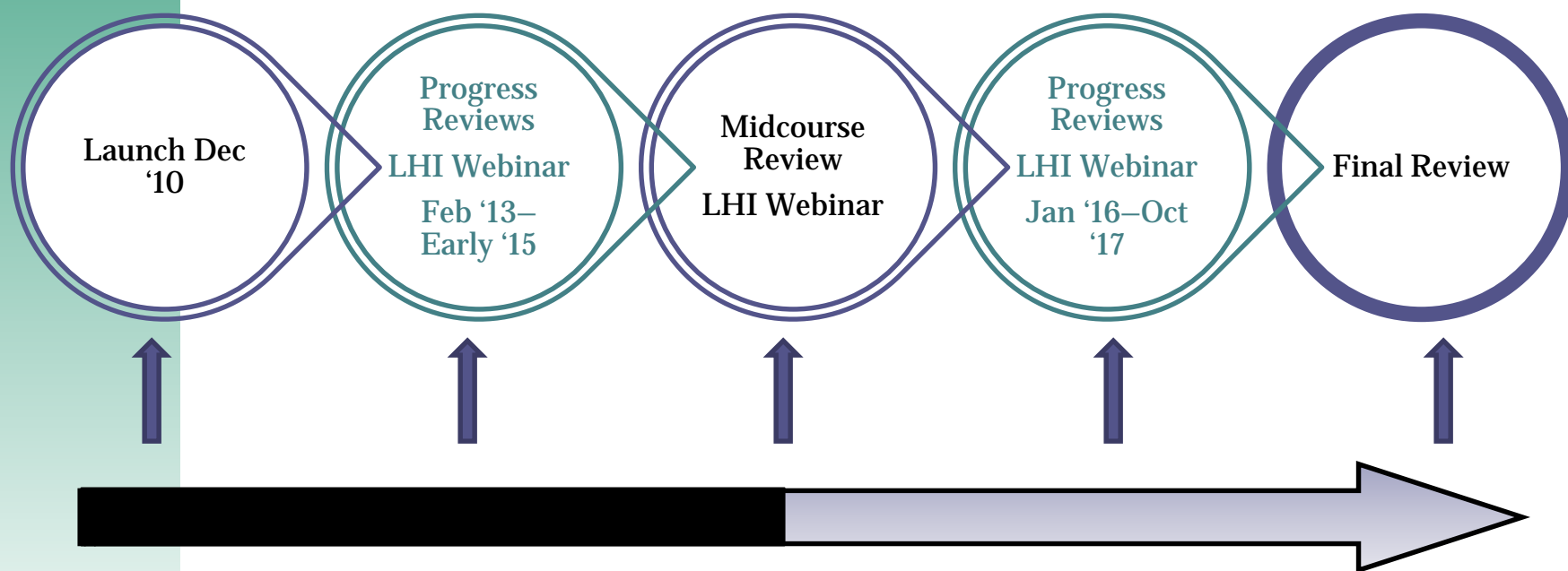

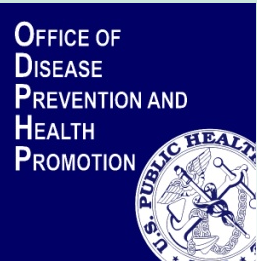
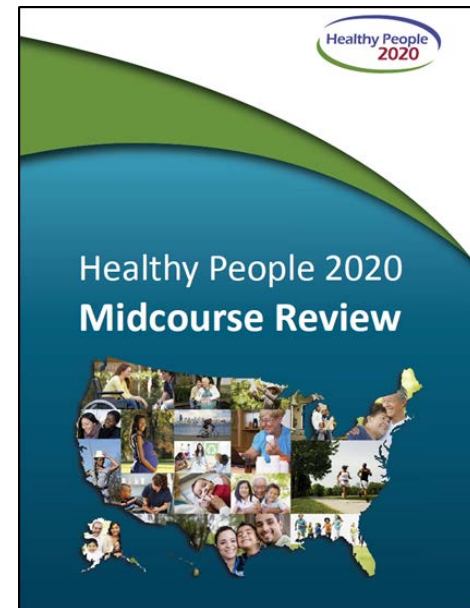


HP2020 Midcourse Review (MCR)

■ What is it?

- Data report published by NCHS assessing the status of HP2020 Topic Area objectives mid-decade
- In-depth focus on data trends and movement
- Assessing disparities is critical to promoting health equity
- Useful tool to benchmark progress and plan for rest of decade
- Considers new science and data

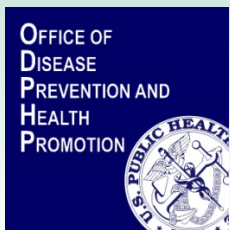
